Economic Issues

Economy

The Action for Healthy Communities Project looked at the local economy through employment, unemployment and poverty rates, local salaries, the number of new homes built, the amount of taxes raised and the perceptions of local residents about their own economic well-being.

More local residents worked in 1998 than in previous years. There was a more than 4% increase in employment countywide over 1997, with the largest increases found in the agriculture and wholesale trade industries (17% and 16%, respectively).

Local unemployment rates dropped in 1998, 4.2% compared to 4.7% in 1997.

When asked about their own financial status, 50% of residents responding to a telephone survey reported they felt "better off" than the year before; 41% of face-to-face survey respondents said the same.

Locally, the average per capita personal income for 1997 was \$22,568, a 5.4% increase over the previous year. Both state and national personal income rates for the same time period increased almost 5%.

For families, the median family income increased more than either state or national rates, however the income levels themselves were less. The average family income in 1998 was \$46,200,

compared with a state level of \$58,500 and national level of \$55,200.

The number of local residents receiving state and federal assistance also decreased, according to 1997 figures. The total number of persons receiving TANF/AFDC decreased by 36%, with family receipts down by 28%.

When compared with home prices statewide, San Luis Obispo County does appear affordable. The average local home price is \$181,268, compared with a state average price of \$201,966. However although housing costs appear affordable when compared to state prices, local income levels are even lower by comparison, which points to limited availability of affordable housing. This is borne out by other indicators related to availability of affordable housing.

For instance, fifty-five percent of the telephone survey respondents indicated one-third of their income goes to housing and 38% reported that one half of their income goes to housing.

There was a 47% increase in local building permits for single-family homes, alterations and additions in 1998, a significant increase over previous years. Non-residential construction increased by 9% over previous years.

Another sign of a healthy economy is in how much money people are spending. Retail sales countywide have been rising, 9% by latest estimate, 2% higher than the state average.

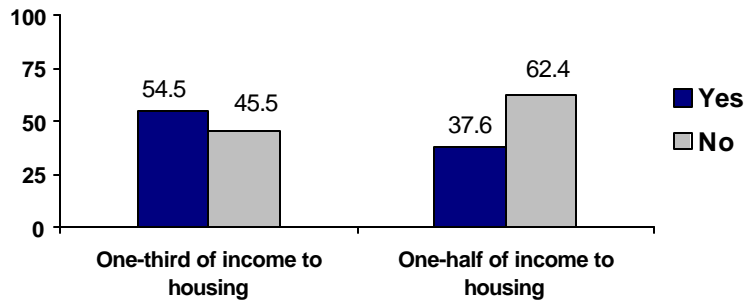
